Rope Swings put up by members of the public	Students Visiting Staff Rangers <i>Being hit by swing falling from swing</i>	Clear instructions not to use. Close monitoring of students Woodland Trust informed for removal if necessary.				
Lost Children	Students <i>Distress Abduction Injury</i>	Students to work in defined areas under direct adult supervision. Regular headcounts of whole group or sub-group as appropriate. Rangers follow Incident Procedure if child

Animal faeces	<p>Students</p> <p><i>Infection / Diseases</i></p>	<p>Students told not to handle. If appropriate, rubber gloves to be used.</p> <p>Antiseptic wipes carried by staff in first aid kit. Hands to be washed on return to centre.</p>

Slips, trips and falls during tracking and sensory games	Students Visiting Staff Rangers <i>Injuries to feet / legs</i>	Briefing regarding safe movement. Work in pairs (blind/spotter). Sites chosen to be free of trip hazard as far as practicable				
Falling tree debris	Students Visiting Staff Rangers <i>Head injuries Crushing debris in eyes</i>	In periods following major storms there are large amounts of debris 'hung up' in trees. Pick route with care. Walk at front of group following periods of high winds. Do not use woods in periods of high winds. Inspect trees in work areas for signs of decay. Move to new area if suspect	Inform other staff of dangerous trees / areas			
Sloping hill	Student Staff Rangers <i>Collision with other people, tripping in rabbit holes</i>	Students are briefed to walk around the site. No running down the hill. If rolling is allowed by school then is done under supervision in specified area.

Road walking with groups (Day time)	Student Staff Rangers Car drivers <i>Collision with vehicles</i>	Groups walk in single file facing traffic. One leader to walk in front of group and warn of approaching traffic. Group advised to wear high vis jackets Children briefed before setting off and reminded when paths end.				
Farm machinery	Students Staff Rangers <i>Being run over Lacerations</i>	Keep students in group supervised by teachers. Do not let students touch equipment Be prepared to alter route if farm machinery in operation.				
Farm gates	Student Staff Rangers <i>Bruises minor cuts and grazes. Strains and</i>	Do not allow students to climb on gates/fences. Opening of gates often involves lifting – use manual handling techniques

Infection from pollution	Students Staff Rangers <i>Infectious diseases - leptospirosis</i>	All cuts to be covered with plasters. Rangers briefed on procedures and awareness of different risks. Do not drink water Do not put hands in mouth. Wash hands thoroughly after activity, use antibacterial gel.				
High water levels / force of water	Students Staff Rangers <i>Drowning Being swept off feet</i>	Inspection of stream prior to use with group as levels vary enormously following rainfall. Use site specific areas where water depth has been assessed by marker pole. Do not use stream if water levels high i.e water is above normal bank level				
Objects in water	Students Staff Rangers <i>Being struck by debris, cuts</i>	Use site specific locations previously inspected for glass, barbed wire, etc

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Potential Adders nest in wall surrounding church	Students Staff Rangers <i>Snake bites</i>	Brief students on importance keeping away from Ha Ha walls Supervision by school staff				
Barbed wire surrounding Ha Ha	Students Staff Rangers <i>Cuts</i>	Brief students on importance keeping away from Ha Ha walls Supervision by school staff				
Breeding swans	Students Staff Rangers <i>Attach from swans</i>	Staff and students to retreat from swans when aggressive tendencies are shown. This can occur when guarding young and nest.				

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Lakes	Student Staff Rangers <i>Drowning / immersion and hypothermia</i>	Orienteering markers set up so they can be observed by member of staff. Orienteering course set up so that lake edge protected by boundary fence. Briefing of students makes clear that there is no need to cross fences/go near water.				
Dower House	Students <i>Being struck by falling brickwork</i>	At the present time the Dower House is surrounded by a security fence. Ensure students are supervised by school staff when near area.

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Unsighted areas	Students <i>Trips and slips Barbed wire</i>	Brief students on operation of blind trail and orienteering course. Adults to supervise group and spread out across fields to help in viewing areas.				
Sloping hill	Student Staff Rangers <i>Collision with other people, tripping in</i>	Students are briefed to walk around the site. No running down the hill. If rolling is allowed by school then is done under supervision in specified area.

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Falling into the water	Students Staff Rangers <i>Immersion / drowning</i>	Brief students on expected behaviour. Strict supervision of group on tow paths. Carry throw line near deep water. Do not allow students to cross on lock gates.	Carry warm clothing / rescue blankets			
Slip between boat and bank	Students Staff Rangers <i>Immersion Crush injury</i>	Do not allow students to get too close to canal edge/boat as slip between two represents a hazard. Do not allow students to operate or climb on canal boats.
